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
UNICEF Supports Data Quality Assurance in Ghana -Pg.2

This was a reflection of a collective commitment on behalf of DPs membership to undertake the appropriate actions to further leverage data for sustainable development in Ghana.


UNFPA and the Embassy of Denmark becomes new host for the Ghana Statistical Service Development Partners Group (GSSDPG)

Supported by IOM, UNFPA, UNICEF & the Embassy of Denmark

On the 9th of April 2024, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) handed over the hosting responsibility for the Ghana Statistical Service Development Partners Group (GSSDPG) platform to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) and the Embassy of Denmark.

The handover event featured insightful discussions, where the outgoing host shared the group's successes and experiences, which informed discussions around strategies to strengthen the platform's process of engagement. This included fostering collaboration and cooperation amongst DPs, coordinating and harmonizing DP programs for successful support to GSS.

The Deputy Statistician emphasized the GSS's commitment to utilizing data for national development and highlighted the importance of collaboration in data production. The new hosts (UNFPA and the Embassy of Denmark) outlined possible deliverables for the group, including the development of key performance indicators for accountability and ways to increase visibility of the group.



Data Quality Assurance

Operational Manual for the National Statistical System

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Development of National Accounts and Price Statistics

Supported by AFRITAC WEST 2/ IMF

The Ghana Statistical Service (GSS) continued to develop and improve national accounts (NA) and price statistics to ensure high quality and relevant data are available for decision making. Two follow up missions conducted in March assisted ongoing activities in both NA and Consumer Price Index (CPI).

The national accounts mission continued to support with the development processes of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) rebasing. Regular rebasing is essential to ensure that GDP volume estimates remain relevant.

The primary objective of the CPI mission was to assist the GSS with assessing the latest Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES) data for the purpose of deriving CPI weights and assisting with the CPI update.

UNICEF Supports Data Quality Assurance in Ghana

Following the development of a multi-stakeholder Data Quality Assurance Framework (DQAF) for the National Statistical System in Ghana, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) supported the Ghana Statistical Service (GSS) to develop an operational manual in January 2024.

The DQAF, which was earlier developed by the GSS, will guarantee uniformity in the production and utilization of statistics produced from diverse sources in the country.

As part of the preparatory activities to operationalise the data quality assurance framework for the National Statistical System, a multistakeholder drafting team consisting of selected staff of the Ghana Statistical Service, academia, and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) was constituted to prepare an operational manual.

The DQAF manual is expected to guide the DQAF Secretariat and experts who will be quality-assuring statistical processes and products within the National Statistical System.

Both the operational manual and the DQAF will be launched concurrently this year, after approval by GSS Management and the National Statistical Advisory Committee.

Also, the Chief- Field Office for UNICEF, Mr. Bhanu Pathak, in his remarks, mentioned that it is always important to generate relevant, quality and timely data and ensure that they inform programming around the national development agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The dissemination event provided a platform to engage key stakeholders involved in policy decision-making, planning, monitoring and evaluation at the sub-national level.

The 2022 Ghana Demographic and Health Survey Report Reaches the Northern, North East, Upper East and Oti Regions

On 5th March 2024, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) supported the Ghana Statistical Service (GSS) in a workshop to disseminate the 2022 Ghana Demographic and Health Survey Report to key stakeholders from the Northern, North East, Upper East and Oti Regions of Ghana.


The workshop which took place in Tamale in the Northern Region and brought together 183 participants across the four (4) regions, drawn from the Regional and Coordinating Councils, Regional and District Health (Directorates), Civil Society Organisations, Non-Governmental Organizations, Ghana Statistical Service and the media.

In his welcome address, the Deputy Head for the Regional Offices Directorate of the Ghana Statistical Service, Dr. Kobina Abaka Ansah, reiterated the relevance of the event and how efforts are increasingly being made by the global data community to provide quality official statistics for a more effective evidence-based planning and decisionmaking for socio-economic development.

Based on the evidence, users' needs gathered, and options suggested by GSS, ONS is recommending delivering a weeklong training course for up to 60 GSS statisticians, including regional statisticians, with a 'train the trainer' format. This would potentially enable GSS to deliver subsequent training at district level, covering up to 4000 officers in total. ONS has also recommended on-going engagement to support the developing microdata landscape.

Next steps include agreeing workshop details with GSS and delivering training by summer 2024

Scoping Mission on Administrative Data and Quality Assurance


Improving administrative data quality has been identified by the Ghana Statistical Service (GSS) as a key priority area to ensure better use of admin data in the production of statistics.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) Methodology and Quality Directorate (MQD) team undertook a scoping mission in Accra from 5th to 9th February 2024.

The purpose of the visit was to identify clear user requirements, obtain a better understanding of the local challenges in the admin data space, and specify the content of any capacity building activity.

With this focus, the team met with the GSS staff from the Social & Demographic directorate, Regional Statisticians, as well as users and producers of statistics in two district offices in Suhum and La Dade Kotopon, to better understand evolving requirements and challenges.

The visiting team also had useful insights from the Office of the Head of Local Government Service, the National Development Planning Commission, Births and Deaths Registry and Statistics Denmark.

Building up from the 3 waves of business tracker done in the previous years, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in collaboration with Ghana Statistical Service (GSS), World bank and the European Union launched wave 4 of the business tracker. It investigates the impact of the pandemic and subsequent crisis on private sector development.

The aim of this survey is to understand and monitor the profound impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on Ghanaian businesses and to provide recommendation necessary for the Government of Ghana and Development Partners.

The data gathered from the last three surveys (wave 1-3), has been used to assess the evolving situation faced by businesses across the country. The fourth wave moves further to focus on the impact of internal and external shocks on Ghanaian businesses and how they cope with the challenges they face.


The study found that Ghanaian Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) are resilient despite the challenges they face. Approximately 12% of the surveyed businesses were using digital technologies to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and other internal /external shocks.

The survey also identified that companies have integrated energy-efficient solutions in their operations. One in ten firms report that they are using energyefficient manufacturing equipment. More than two-thirds of micro, small and medium firms report not having a target for energy consumption.

Collaboration now entering its second phase in March 2024

In mid-March, Ghana Statistical Services, Statistics Denmark (Danmarks Statistik) and the Embassy of Denmark in Ghana signed a Memorandum of Understanding. This marked the beginning of the second phase of the Strategic Sector Cooperation on Statistics in Ghana.

At the event, a panel discussed the power of data. The debate revolved around data sharing agreements, use of administrative data in general and ensuring that development in statistics is efficient and user-driven. The panel consisted of the following representatives from national statistical institutions and academia: Prof. Samuel Annim, Director Carsten Zangenberg, Dr. Grace Bediko, and Prof. William Baah-Boateng.

The project partners look forward to be using the lessons learned from the first phase and to be working together for three more years. Striving to produce reliable, consistent, objective, and effective statistics to inform data-driven decision-making in Ghana!

Measuring SDG 16.6.2 using citizen enerated Data Methodology

In an innovative step towards prioritizing citizen- driven data collection, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in collaboration with the Ghana Statistical Service (GSS) launched the citizen science project. This project will utilize Citizen Generated Data methodology to collect real time feedback from citizens, enhancing their understanding of public service quality and accessibility.

As part of this initiative, the Public Service Satisfactory Survey (PSSS) App was also launched. This app will utilize citizen generated data methodology to assess SDG indicator 16.6.2 which focuses on the proportion of the population satisfied with their last public service experience. In January 2024, the project was launched in two pilot municipalities namely Ga East and Suhum.

This project aims at empowering citizens, including persons with disabilities to actively contribute to the improvement of public service delivery in health, education and Government- issued identification Services. It will also be crucial in achieving SDG indicator 16.6.2 and enhancing policy interventions in planning and providing public services.
