

Newsletter Consumer Price Index (CPI) March 2021

Summary

- National inflation from March 2020 to March 2021 was 10.3%.
- National month-on-month inflation from February 2021 to March 2021 was 0.9%.
- Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages inflation was 10.8% and average Non-Food inflation 10.0%.
- Regional inflation was between 17.0% in Greater Accra and 5.3% in the Volta Region.

Government Statistician Says:

"March 2021 inflation was 10.3%. This shows relative stability in inflation between February and March 2021. On a month-on-month basis, Food inflation was 0.2%, which is lower than 7 other Divisions. Education Services recorded no month-on-month inflation."

March 2021 Inflation

The national year-on-year inflation rate was 10.3% in March 2021, which is same as the 10.3% recorded in February 2021 (see Table 1). Month-on-month inflation between February and March 2021 was 0.9% (slightly higher than last month). 'Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas' (29.0% up from 23.4% last month) and 'Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages' (10.8% down from 12.3% last month) recorded the highest rates of inflation. 


Figure 1: Year-on-year inflation March 2021 and the average over the last 12 months, by Division.



Regional Inflation





Figure 3: Year-on-year overall, Food and Non-Food inflation rates for March 2021 by region.

At the regional level, the overall year-on-year inflation ranged from 5.3% in the Volta Region to 17.0% in Greater Accra Region (See Figure 3). Only in the Greater Accra Region (11.5% Food inflation and 21.0% Non-Food inflation) that Non-Food outpace Food inflation. The largest difference in Food and Non-Food inflation was again recorded in Eastern Region (14.7% and 1.7% respectively). Overall, year-on-year inflation went up in four regions compared to last month (see Figure 7).







Food and Non-Food Inflation




Figure 6: Composition of year-on-year inflation. Total height indicates total inflation and percentages indicate the contribution to total inflation. For all months, the contribution of the `Transport', `Housing' and `Food' Divisions is shown and for the current month, the contribution of all 13 Divisions is shown on the right side of the plot.

This month Food inflation (10.8%) was both lower than last month (12.3%) and the average of the previous 12 months (12.8%). This leads to Food inflation decreasing in its contribution to total inflation to 46.3%, the lowest contribution observed since February 2020 (see Figure 6 on the final page). Overall month-on-month Food inflation was 0.2%. Only Education Services recorded no change between February and March 2021, all other Divisions recorded positive month-on-month inflation (See Figure 2).

Within the Food Division, Tea (16.7%) recorded the highest rate of inflation (see Figure 4). Vegetables and Fish and Other Seafood recorded negative month-on-month inflation (-0.1% and -0.1% respectively) in March 2021.

In contrast to Food inflation, Non-Food year-on-year inflation on average went up this month compared to last month (from 8.8% to 10.0%). Out of the 13 Divisions, six had higher year-on-year inflation in March 2021 than the rolling average over the last 12 months. Especially, Housing recorded a high rate of inflation (29.0%) (see Figure 1). Looking at Figure 5, it becomes clear that especially in Greater Accra, a high rate of month-on-month inflation for Housing was recorded. This high rate can be attributed to an observed increase in rent prices. Average month-on-month Non-Food inflation was 1.4%. This is same as what was recorded for last month (1.4%).

Figure 2: National month-on-month inflation rates for different Divisions.

As shown in Figure 5, on a month-on-month basis Ashanti Region recorded the highest overall inflation (2.0%) and Upper West Region the lowest (-0.9%). In Ashanti region, higher rates of inflation was recorded for only 1 out of 13 Divisions in the period February to March 2021 as compared to the same period in 2020.

Imported and Local Inflation

The inflation of imported goods was 6.8% (up from 6.7% last month), while the inflation for locally produced items was 11.7% on average (same as the 11.7% recorded last month). Month-on-month inflation for imported goods was 0.5% and for locally produced goods 1.0%.




Figure 7: Both year-on-year and month-on-month inflation by region.
