## Youth population to increase by 6 million before 2050

Population projections highlight importance of addressing youth challenges

The youth population in Ghana is projected to increase by six million over the next few decades. This information emanates from the 2021 Population and Housing Census (PHC) Thematic Report on Population Projections (2021 – 2050) which projects that the **population aged 15 to 35 years in Ghana will increase from 11.7 million in 2021 to 17.7 million in 2050**, highlighting the importance in investing in the youth population.

The overall youth unemployment in Q3 2023 was 21.7 percent according to the Annual Household Income and Expenditure Survey (AHIES) Labour Statistics Bulletin. Seven in every 10 (72.4%) unemployed persons in Q3 2023 was aged 15 to 35 years. In all, an estimated 1.3 million youth were unemployed in the third quarter of 2023.

An estimated 3.1 million employed youth were in vulnerable employment i.e. selfemployed without employees or a contributing family worker. Two in every three (63.9%) persons aged 15 to 35 that was employed in Q3 2023 was in vulnerable employment. The percentage of youth workers in vulnerable employment was substantially higher for females (71.3%) compared to males (55.7%).

One in every 10 (10.6%) persons aged 15 to 35 years did not use an ICT device in the three months preceding the Census Night (27<sup>th</sup> June 2021) according to the 2021 PHC Thematic Brief on Digital Exclusion. At least a quarter of the youth population did not use an ICT device during the period in three regions - North East (33.0%), Upper East (28.6%), and Savannah (24.6%).

Nationally, over a million (1.2 million) youth were digitally excluded during the 2021 PHC i.e., they did not use an ICT device within the previous three months. Also, 2.3 million youth, representing one in every five (19.7%) persons aged 15 to 35 years did not use the internet in the three months before the Census Night.

International Youth Day is commemorated annually on 12<sup>th</sup> August to raise awareness of issues that concern youth. The theme for 2024 is "From Clicks to Progress: Youth Digital Pathways for Sustainable Development."

The StatsBank is a repository for macroeconomic indicators, trade indicators, the 2017 Ghana Census of Agriculture, the 2010 and 2021 Population and Housing Censuses, and the 2022-2023 Annual Household Income and Expenditure Survey.
